Get to Know the New Assistant Principal!

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Exclusive Interview with Dr. Haggquist, New Assistant Principal

As many of you are likely aware, there's a new assistant principal on campus this year, and his name is Haggquist! It's not every day that we see someone new take up the mantle, so we wanted to give you readers an opportunity to get acquainted with PGHS's brand new assistant principal by hearing directly from the man himself. We reached out to the good doctor to ask him some questions about everything from his life to school lunches, and here's what he had to say!

Q: What was your background before working at PGHS?

A: The way I got into teaching was by working at Ventura Unified School District-- I was a water polo coach, substitute teacher, and a waiter at a local restaurant. My first actual teaching job was at Mount Pleasant high school near San Jose. As part of my training, I got to teach at the prison school. I also got to teach at a few group homes. So, I had a lot of experience in settings that are much different than Pacific Grove in terms of discipline.

Q: What was the selection process for you being selected as assistant principal?

A: I actually had interviewed for a number of different positions in the school district after I got my doctorate in organizational leadership. I knew that



I wanted to increase my capacity as a leader within the district, so really I sought any opportunity that came about, and this one was the position that fit the best for me, having been at this site for 25 years and having held several different roles.

Q: What is it like being assistant principal compared to a normal faculty member?

A: It feels a lot different. The main difference is that as a classroom teacher I had an ability to structure my days: it was my lesson plan, I knew what was going to happen. So I would design my units, and my daily lessons, and I was in control. Here as an assistant principal, I can come to work with every intention to work on a project, but there's a lot of unpredictability about how my day will go. I'll find

that I look at my clock at the end of the day and it's already 4 p.m., and I'm thinking "I didn't even get a single thing done!"

Q: What's been the most difficult thing about being assistant principal so far?

A: For me, it's not being in the classroom teaching. I love teaching, I'm a teacher at heart. When I walk into classrooms, I just have this feeling-- I love connecting with students. I really miss the opportunity to have that stage, to have that ability to design with and inspire students through my teaching. That is for sure the hardest thing.

Q: What do you feel is the most important thing for the school right now?

A: To me, student engagement. I've actually been quite impressed; I've been in classrooms and I've seen the level of engagement being strong. We've got great teachers, we've got great students, we've got great people. And when the relationships are strong, it's easier for people to stay engaged. The most important thing is making sure that our school is dynamic and fun, and that students want to stay engaged in their classes—that they want to learn. Not just about academics, but about extracurriculars: how to become a better athlete on the field, or a better actor in their drama production, or a better singer in their choir, or a better attorney in their mock trial group. It's always about helping people to learn and better themselves.

Q: What are your thoughts on school lunch?
A: I think we've got amazing variety. There's a lot of choice-- When I was younger, there wasn't as much variety, and you had to take the lunch that they served you. "Here's your pizza," "Here's your macaroni and cheese," or whatnot. You couldn't choose a burger if you didn't want the pizza, or get a nice sandwich, or a salad. We even have teachers who go down and get the school lunches themselves, which is really cool. I think it's pretty impressive that we can offer great meals twice a day, every day, with such variety and healthy choices, all for free.

We'd like to give a huge thanks to Dr. Haggquist for taking the time to be interviewed, and we hope he accomplishes great things as assistant principal!
