If a group receives all superior ratings for the performance, they are invited back that night to perform.

The band performed first, with a set consisting of "Celia," a hip-hop swing tune; "Hickory and Twine," a funk piece; "Stolen Moments"; and a vocal tune, "Saint Louis Blues." The band received all superiors in their performance, but a lower score in sight-reading. The band was sadly not invited back for a command performance that night, but was still satisfied with the performance. Culinary Team Excels at First Competition!

Our school recently showcased its culinary prowess and entrepreneurial spirit through various competitions, leaving a mark of excellence and innovation. In the heart of intense culinary battles, our school's team achieved an impressive 5th place out of 31 teams in the Culinary Competition. The requirements of the competition are as follows: six plates of food—a three-course meal with two identical plates each—prepared in just one hour, using only two camping burners without electricity. Despite the challenges, the team delivered outstanding dishes that wowed both judges and peers alike. Matias De La Garza wowed with a tantalizing appetizer featuring a seared sea scallop on celery root puree, galangal cream, fried cordyceps (orange mushrooms), and microgreens, dressed with a chili vinaigrette. George Hatfield's expertise shined in the entree—a Hoisin glazed pan-fried duck breast with duck-fat-fried sweet potatoes, a harmony of flavors and textures. Yeva Yevdash's foundation for the entree, with maple 5-spice carrot puree, Japanese eggplant, sautéed mushrooms and scallions, and a savory-sweet-and-spicy sauce, perfectly complemented the dish. Destiny Craft's twist on a classic Chinese dessert, filling sesame balls with mascarpone cream and pairing them with tangerine curd, fresh kumquats, blackberries, and yuzu chocolate snow, was a symphony of flavors.

Our school's entrepreneurial spirit shined bright in the Management Cup, securing a commendable 3rd place. The challenge was to develop a comprehensive business plan, design a menu, and deliver a compelling pitch to 18 business professionals. "Hippie Hash," the team's '70s-themed food truck concept, impressed judges, who expressed readiness to invest and enjoy the food immediately.

George excelled in the Baked Potato Competition, while Caitlyn Botes contributed to crafting delectable hot dogs. These two had so much fun and the culinary team cheered the whole time. Culinary Team Excels at First Competition!

The robotics competition season is moving along and our team, The BreakerBots, is in preparation for the final upcoming competition at the Monterey Bay Regional. The majority of the eight-week build season was devoted to the construction of the club's two most recent robots, *Hurricane* and *Typhoon*. The *Hurricane* bot was primarily built as a prototype while *Typhoon* is intended to be the finalized, competition-ready version.


Earlier in the season, the BreakerBots team attended the Silicon Valley Regional from February 29 to March 3, and fought strong. We are now adjusting the design of *Typhoon* and improving some of its functions based on its prior performance at Silicon Valley.

Some design errors were noted concerning the accuracy of the design. *Typhoon* uses a system that basically sucks up a note from the group using two rods beside each other with plastic wheels on each one. Then, using a treadmill system, *Typhoon* will aim the note at an angle while continuously spinning the treadmill faster, eventually shooting it at the desired target.

Another design aspect of *Typhoon* involves curving the note to put it in the smaller target that is level with the robot's height. One design concern noted for the projectile was that of angular variance, which only allowed the note to hit the target at its dead center sometimes, while on other occasions it would miss. Another design error concerned the bending mechanism, where the note would end up not curving enough, resulting in it falling off and not going into the hole

The BreakerBots have corrected these design flaws and have continued to improve upon *Typhoon* using methods including CAD (Computer-Aided Design) to have a better, more accurate robot for the Monterey Bay Regional. Our team aims to improve our performance and hopes to see you there at Seaside High School from March 27 to March 30!

Justice for Justus

On February 26th, PGHS was shocked to discover that 10th grade world history teacher and Billy Joel superfan Justus Grate had been suspended based on parent complaints. While the suspension was initially rumored to be only two weeks, its length has now been confirmed to be for an indefinite amount of time, and many believe it will last for the duration of the 2023-2024 school year. In his absence, a substitute teacher, Mr. Shane McCloud, has been assigned to fill Mr. Grate's solid color polos.

Mr. Grate's teaching personality is undeniably eccentric. Those who have taken his class can attest to his many antics and animated demeanor. However, what is equally undeniable is his love of world history, and his skill for teaching it. The impressive scores his students are annually awarded on the AP World History Exam is proof of this fact. As such, his sudden removal has not sat well with many of both his current and former students. These students have rallied together under the tagline "Justice for Justus" to support their favorite world history teacher.

One such student is Coben Dreisbach. Coben is a PGHS sophomore and AP World History student who has been organizing a petition to have Mr. Grate reinstated. We spoke to him to hear his opinion on the matter.

Coben described the impact of Mr. Grate's absence on his class as "quite negative." He cites the complete cessation of many hallmarks of Grate's class such as daily lectures, quizzes, and supplemental reading packets intended to enhance students' understanding of the material. Additionally, Coben stated that his class has been "completely left alone" in regards to preparation for the AP test, which is arguably one of the most important facets of an AP class and necessary to earn college credit.

He went on to reiterate his experience with Mr. Grate during the school year as being very positive. "I love Mr. Grate," he said, "I love his personality and the way he teaches history. He gets you into the moment and really makes you feel like you're there - it's very captivating." He also stated that this was an opinion shared by many of his classmates. In fact, his petition to lift Mr. Grate's suspension had already collected over 140 signatures at the time of being interviewed. Finally, Coben stated that like-minded students can make their voice heard by signing petitions, emailing the school administration, and spreading the word to as many as possible.

However, protest over Mr. Grate's suspension has not been limited only to students. Since the suspension, the school has been flooded with emails from parents voicing their concerns and asking to have him reinstated. In fact, Coben's mother Janna has organized a parent-led email petition on Mr. Grate's behalf. We reached out to ask what motivated her to join the Justice for Justus movement.

Janna stated the importance of hearing all perspectives on a person, and not only the complaints. "People are complicated creatures," she said, "and we should not only focus on what we don't like about someone. It's important to remember the positive things as well." She is uncertain if the school will be willing to listen, but declared the importance of speaking up for one's views, saying "We learn and grow from questioning things that don't feel right." She also repeated Coben's message, reminding students that those who want to speak up for Mr. Grate can do so by emailing school administration or the district's Human Resource Department.

Mr. Grate is a beloved figure among many of PGHS' students. While it is unknown at this time what further actions, if any, the school will take in regards to his suspension, it is clear that students and their families will not be going quiet any time soon.
